


The Sustainable Development Goal 1 aims to "End poverty in all its forms everywhere." (UNESCO, 2017).

What is poverty?

Poverty threshold

According to the UN nearly half of the world's population currently lives in poverty, defined as income of less than US \$2 per day, including one billion children. Of those living in poverty, over 800 million people live in extreme poverty, surviving on less than US \$1.25 a day.
